LeadershipREPORT

The death of George Floyd at the hands of the Minneapolis Police Department sent shockwaves throughout not just Minnesota, but the world. The ensuing worldwide protests highlight the global importance of the Black Lives Matter movement and its calls to stamp out racism. Carl Sandburg, aside from being a poet, was a journalist who covered the Chicago riots of 1919. He described the active role the police played as they desecrated black neighborhoods. In Minneapolis, it does not feel like much has changed since then. The video of George Floyd's death shocked and motivated the nation, and the world, to protest the ongoing injustices perpetrated



both legally and illegally against the BIPOC communities. For many, especially in Minneapolis, this incident was not surprising. Sadly, it was one of many instances over the years of an unjust death of a black man with no substantial change to the MPD or its union.

This year is also the 50th anniversary of the first Pride Parade that came about a year after the Stonewall Uprising, a response to a violent police raid on a gay bar in New York. 50 years later, there are still laws being passed to discriminate against the LGBTQIA community. This underscores the importance that, while there has been an outpouring support for the Black Lives Matter initiative and the LGBTQIA efforts for globally equity, the road has, and will be, a continuing struggle for years to come.

While these protests have revolved around singular events, the calls for justice revolve around a multitude of issues that impact the BIPOC and LGBTQIA communities. Police reform, the prison system, homelessness, healthcare, education, and even climate change; the lasting justice and racial equity sought is impacted by many facets of our society.

There are immediate needs—such as food and basic supplies to communities in Minneapolis—and there are long-term goals to build racial equity. I implore you to research and understand the variety of issues at play and look into many organizations, what they are doing, why it is needed, and how one can help—both for the immediate and long-term needs. While there will be no quick fixes, we can keep taking steps toward a more equitable society.

LOMP TO SPONSOR POETRY OUT LOUD

LOMP will be sponsoring Minnesota's 2021 Poetry Out Loud, a high school competition coordinated by South Central Service Cooperative, North Mankato. The program encourages high school students to learn about poetry through memorization and performance, to master public speaking skills, and to build self-confidence.

The League will be listed in all materials generated by the competition, including announcements of the competition, programs at regional and state events, etc. We will need to provide volunteer judges and event volunteers (to staff the registration table, help collect judge's score sheets, etc.) for each regional contest. In the past, there have been five regions, but COVID-19permitting, there may be more in 2021. There will be 10 to 14 qualifiers, and LOMP will award a free student membership to those who advance to the final competition (for a minimum of five memberships).

LOMP will be allowed to publicize the Manningham, NFSPS college scholarships, our contests, and other relevant events. We hope to invite the state champions (maybe the top 3) to perform at future LOMP meetings. Stay tuned for more information about this great opportunity to work with high school poetry enthusiasts.

QUALIFICATIONS

- 1. Poems must be the original work of the contestant. You may submit previously published poems for *Category 2* if your submission has never won a prize. All other submissions must be unpublished.
- 2. Poems that have won **monetary** awards are not eligible.
- 3. A poem can be submitted for only one category.
- 4. Submit only one poem per category, except *Category 1*, where the limit is 8 poems.
- 5. Sponsors may enter a poem in the category they sponsor.
- 6. Print poems on plain 8 1/2 x 11 white paper. Do not include artwork or copyright marks. Choose a legible font, use only one column, and do not duplex.
- 7. All poems—with the exception of haiku—must be titled.
- 8. If the poem exceeds one page, staple the pages together.
- 9. Submit 2 copies of each poem:
 - Include only the category number and category name in the upper left corner. This copy will be used for judging, and must not have any identifying marks.
 - On the second copy, add your name, address, email address and LOMP membership status to the upper right corner.
