Year in Review



The lifting of mask mandates ushered in 2022. Eager to return to our much loved in-person events, plans for Blizzard were underway. A big house was rented, and registration began, but a bit too soon. New Covid cases continued, and people were still a bit too leery to venture

into rooms with others. The Blizzard Retreat was moved back to Zoom, and we hoped for an in-person Spring Conference.

In February, the board voted to change the name of our anthology, The Moccasin. The League of Minnesota Poets had been publishing The Moccasin in one form or another for 84 years. The publication had been named after the Minnesota state flower, the Showy Ladyslipper, also commonly known as the Moccasin in the Anglo culture of our

founding members in the 1930s. The word "moccasin" is an anglicization of the Ojibwe word "makizinan." History has not

changed, but our understanding of it has. Today, we acknowledge



the painful wounds of ethnocide, genocide and the forced displacement of indigenous people here in Minnesota. We cannot change our past, but we can examine it and use our understanding of it to improve our future together. This is why the board voted to change the annual publications name to Agates. Glaciers dispersed the Lake Superior Agate, Minnesota's state gem stone, throughout the state making them both common and unique. Like us, each has its individual beauty. The new name plated designed by member Deborah Goschy reflects the waters of Minnesota.

We represented the League in the annual Twin Cities Pride March June 27, 2022. Our numbers were divided between this and the National Federation of State Poetry Societies' Annual Convention in Columbus, OH the same weekend. In Minneapolis, we promoted the addition of 2 LGBTQ categories to our annual contest. We distributed 3000 flyers that day and another 3000 prior to the contest deadline July 31, 2022.



the name change of the League's annual anthology was announced and Meredith Cook was recognized and applauded for her 36 years of editing The Moccasin. Peter Stein completed his 3rd consecutive term as President and Amanda Bailey was elected President. Adam Rangel was elected Vice President, but shortly thereafter resigned. Jana Bouma was appointed Interim Vice President until a permanent appointment could be made.

The first John Rezmerski Memorial Manuscript contest launched with an August 1, 2022 submission deadline. Summer weather brought lots of outdoor activities including an excellent turn out for the Woodtick Poetry Retreat on Horseshoe Lake.

Bill Anderson and volunteer crew wowed Rain Taxi Book Festival goers in July. Inviting people to write and hang poems on their PoetTree, they promoted the League and sold members' books. At the end of July, the League in collaboration with Button Poetry staged its first BlackBerry Peach National Slam Qualifier at the Icehouse in Minneapolis for a sold out audience. Kevin Yang emerged as the winner and was sent to Daytona Shores, FL in the fall to represent MN at the 4-day national slam with a total of 40 poets. He made it through several preliminary rounds, but did not make it to the final round of 12 poets.

Youth Initiave

Due to unforseen difficulties, awards weren't given in the Manningham Trust Student Poetry Contest by NFSPS. In our state competition, the League awarded 1st Place to Morghaine Gannaway (Junior Division); 3rd Place: Emily Funk; 2nd Place: Ingrid Scholberg; and 1st Place: Emily Jans (Senior Division). Each has been invited to submit their winning poem to NFSPS 2023 Manningham contest. Going forward, students may submit directly to the NFSPS student competition. Isadora Gruye was appointed to CoChair with Brendan Brophy to strategically plan a new League Youth Initiative.

Chapter Reports

Cracked Walnut

In 2022, Cracked Walnut continued to sponsor the Poets & Pints Reading Series (at Sisyphus Brewing on 3rd Wednesdays) and Literary Bridges Reading Series (Next Chapter Booksellers on 2nd Sundays). The Cracked Walnut Poetry Workshops returned to in-person meetings for ongoing opportunities for poetry critique (Highland Park Library on 1st Saturdays). We also run the "Cracked Walnut Writing Collective" where writers gather to work from writing prompts and other activities to generate new writing (Merriam Park Library, 2nd and 4th Wednesdays). In April, one of our board members, Micah Ruelle, taught a class on Indian poetry, "Writing the Book of Love" (Franklin Library, Minneapolis). Cracked Walnut also began publishing a monthly newsletter that promotes not only its activities but those of the League. Penned Poets

2022 was the first full year for this chapter that was founded in November of 2021. The main goal of Penned Poets has been to develop and support a creative community for those outside big population centers, at a far distance from other writing groups, and/or with limited ability to attend in-person meetings. This chapter meets weekly on Zoom and uses rotating meeting formats to include writing workshops, poem discussions, support sessions and performance practice. By the end of the year, this chapter had 70 members, the largest chapter in the League. One thing it can boast is consistent and increasing engagement with member poets.

Our 2022 highlights include hosting the League of Minnesota Poets' Spring Conference and offering our February Bright Lights Stories in the Night zoom event and gallery exhibition/poetry reading, along with a published chapbook of the work and illustrations included in the grant-funded project.

Grand View Poets

Has been a critique chapter of the League, but in 2022 began to plan an expansion. This chapter has no treasury and elects no officers, but Nicole Borg currently serves as their Regional Vice President on the League Board. In December of 2022, Grandview Poets changed the chapter's name to Great River Poets. We hosted a Poetry Potluck social with poems, food and good cheer at an art gallery in December and planned to expand to hosting a monthly poetry workshop (first Tuesday) led by one of our members.. We have more "active" members now than in the past five years, so I could see our programming expanding.

Mississippi Valley Poets & Writers

Besides providing regular programs, critiques and fellowship about poetry weekly, the chapter sponsors a contest with the League and for the Nature Area Poetry Walk. We host and maintain this poetry walk. Every other year, when we replace poems on the signs, we hold a dedication/ reveal ceremony for the Nature Area Poetry Walk. We also create and sell post cards sets of the ten poems on the walk. This chapter's growth in part can be attributed to their ability to have hybrid meetings, in person meetings that include participants on Zoom.


Southern MN Poetry Society
